soil	The top layer of earth where plants grow

seeds	Small parts of a plant that can grow into new plants
marigolds	Garden flowers that are usually yellow, orange, or red
sunflowers	Tall plants with large yellow flowers
sprout	A new plant that has just begun to grow
shoot	A new stem or part of a plant growing upward
raised bed	A garden area with soil held above the surrounding ground
planter	A container or built area used for growing plants

American Culture Notes

These notes explain a few details about everyday American life that may be unfamiliar to some learners.

Backyards

Many American houses have a backyard, a private outdoor area behind the house. Families may use the backyard for playing, gardening, eating outdoors, or relaxing.

Garages

A garage is usually attached to a house or located nearby. It is designed for keeping cars, but families often also use garages to store tools, bicycles, garden supplies, boxes, and other household items.

In the story, the unused area behind the garage gives Sophia a place where she can start her garden without being noticed right away.

Porches

A porch is an outdoor area connected to a house, usually near a door. Some porches are covered. Families may sit on a porch or use it to keep things that are used outdoors.

Sophia finds a small plastic bucket on the porch to use while she works.

Backyard Gardening

Home gardening is a common activity in the United States. People may grow flowers, vegetables, herbs, or fruit in the ground, in containers, or in raised beds.

A raised bed is a garden area built above the surrounding ground. It can help hold the soil in place and can make a small space easier to use for gardening. Jackson offers to build one for Sophia.

Children's Projects

American children are often encouraged to try projects and hobbies on their own, such as gardening, crafts, building models, or caring for pets. Parents may allow children some independence while still keeping an eye on what they are doing.

Sophia begins the garden by herself, and Jackson later joins her. Their parents eventually notice how much time the children are spending together behind the garage and discover what they have made.

Family Words: Mom and Dad

American children commonly call their mother Mom and their father Dad. These are informal, affectionate family words.

Optional Extension Activities

1. Plant a Seed

Plant a bean or another fast-growing seed in a small container.

Students can record:

Day — Water — What I See — Plant Height

Students can draw the plant as it changes.

2. From Seed to Plant

Ask students to draw four or five pictures showing how a plant grows.

Use sequence words:

First — Next — Then — After that — Finally

3. Design a Secret Garden

Students draw their own small garden.

Ask them to label several things in English, such as:

soil — flowers — beans — fence — seeds — water

Students can then describe their garden to a partner.

4. Sophia or Jackson?

Make two columns labeled **Sophia** and **Jackson**.

Students list what each child contributed to the garden.

Discuss how their different skills helped them succeed.

Teacher Note:

Sophia's Secret Garden combines reading comprehension with simple plant science and vocabulary about gardening.

The story can also introduce the idea that seeds need **water and suitable warmth to begin germination**, while the growing plant needs **light, water, and other resources** as it develops. The story itself expresses this in Sophia's child-friendly words: "It just needs the warmth and water to start, and sunlight to grow big."

For beginning ESL learners, teachers may select only a few garden words for active vocabulary. More advanced students can use the story for sequencing, describing plant growth, and discussing how Sophia and Jackson solve problems together.
